Learn the basics of gun cleaning

- Why
- When
- How

WHY??

- Guns get dirty with use and carry
- Guns are not generally very clean as received new
- Reliability is increased
- Longevity is increased
- Accuracy is maintained

WHEN?

Before the first range trip

New guns are usually not very clean.

As needed thereafter

Most guns are designed to run while somewhat dirty. Think of war conditions

Daily carry weapons should be cleaned on a schedule depending on how carried.

Your schedule will be determined over time.

HOW?

Unload the gun....Double check!!
Remove all ammo from the area!!
Check again that the gun is unloaded!!

How?

Check that the gun is not loaded!!

- Field strip the firearm according to manufacturer's instructions
- Clean the bore, chamber and action as instructed.

What do I need?

Bore Brush



What do I need?

Patches



What do I need?

Jag or Loop





What do I need?Cleaning rod or pull cable



What do I need?

- Clean rags and swabs
- Eye protection
- Gloves
- Lubricant/s of choice for your gun
- Work mat or towel
- Manual for your gun
- UNLOADED GUN!!!!!!!

- A word about cleaning and lubrication products
- Solvents
 - Make sure they are safe for your intended purpose and weapon
 - There are "green" alternatives to strong solvents
- Lubrication products
 - Follow the weapon manufacturer's recommendations
 - Old standbys Synthetic motor oil, Ballistol, Rem Oil, ATF, K1 kerosene, and lithium grease
