


# Wild Turkeys in Massachusetts


#### **Pre-colonial turkey distribution**

#### **Decline of turkeys in MA**

- Unregulated harvest/subsistence
- Dramatic changes in habitat/land use/human population
- By 1850 turkeys were extirpated from MA
- Several failed restoration attempts occurred up through the early 1970's.


#### **Restoration Success!**

- 1972-73, 37 wild trapped turkeys were relocated from New York state
- Released in a section of Bear Town State Forest (Berkshire County)






#### **Rapid Turkey Range Expansion**

### **Turkey Breeding Biology**

- Day length is primary stimulus
- Courtship begins in late February - March
- Peak gobbling activity is usually in mid-April
- Gobbling and breeding may continue well into late spring



#### **Male Breeding Behavior**

- Males are polygamous
- Exert dominance over juveniles, other adults
- Distinctive courtship displays - "strutting" - and coloration
- Distinct vocalizations





#### **Spring Turkey Season**

- Timed to avoid peak of breeding activity in mid April
- Harvesting males during mid-April would result in suboptimal reproduction
- Ideally spring hunting occurs when hens are initiating <u>INCUBATION</u>





#### **Turkey Nesting**

- Ground nest in shall depression in litter
- 8-15 eggs, usually 12 in MA
- Brushy habitat, highly variable
- Peak incubation usually begins around first week of May







#### Spring season breakdown

- Fall hunting was more traditional
- Spring tom hunting gained much popularity by the 1950's
- Gobblers very responsive to calls = FUN!!!
- Season timed to avoid significant disturbance to breeding activity
- Subsequent male harvest has minimal impact on population


### Turkey permits issued 2006-2020




### **Reported turkey harvest 2006-2020**




### Spring success rate/% fill both tags




### Spring harvest by age 2006-2020

# Hunt safely!

- Hunt safely sticker affixed to shotgun while sighting down the bore
- Never stalk a turkey, NEVER
- Avoid wearing red, white, blue



- Be sure of your target and what's beyond
- Consider blaze when moving, be cautious with decoys and harvested birds too

# SUMMARY

- Turkey restoration a huge conservation success story
- Turkeys now inhabit almost every town in MA (sorry Nantucket)
- Hunting seasons timed to minimize breeding disturbance, optimizes spring harvest
- Healthy populations exist statewide, turkeys becoming increasingly residential in the past decade
